WEATHER WARNING

There is an <u>amber extreme heat warning</u> for Sunday 17 July, Monday 18 July and Tuesday 19 July, as temperatures will build this weekend and early next week for much of England and Wales.

The amber warning highlights likely adverse health effects for the public, not just limited to those most vulnerable to extreme heat. Temperatures could be in excess of 35°C in the southeast, and more widely around 32°C within the <u>warning area</u>, with Monday and Tuesday most likely to see temperatures around this level.

There is clear government guidance in place, which our school will be following, focusing on <u>looking after children and those in early years settings during heatwaves</u>, including the use of ventilation, keeping children hydrated, and avoiding vigorous physical activity, encouraging children to wear loose, light coloured clothing and sunhats with wide brims, to use sunscreen, and providing them with plenty of water, <u>they do not advise closing schools.</u>

We are fortunate our school is very cool with plenty of ventilation. We will be putting a range of measures in place to accommodate, as we have done previously in hot weather and this week.

<u>What can you do?</u> Please send children into school with a hat, sunscreen and plenty of water, in their water bottle.

Adaptations to our timetable due to weather:

Monday:

Currently, our Race for Life is planned for Monday, as Wednesday is looking to be much cooler, it has been rescheduled for Wednesday morning when temperatures are due to be much lower. Children to come to school in their PE kit.

We will be moving PE to activities to the hall on Monday, so children will not be in direct sunlight.

Tuesday:

To ensure the leavers service takes place, we will be moving it from the Church to the Hall in school at 2:30pm, so children and guests do not need to walk to the church in the heat.

PE Kits

Children do not need to be in their PE kits on Tuesday, Thursday, or Friday. Only Nursery, Reception and Year 6 on Monday as PE will be in the school hall and all children are to wear their PE kit on Wednesday, for Race for Life.


Road Safety Training for Years 3 and 4
