World Mental Health Day

On Thursday this week, we dressed in yellow to raise awareness for mental health and wellbeing on World Mental Health Day. All classes heard the story of 'Ruby's Worry' during collective worship and then completed linked PSHE activities. After their PSHE learning, some of the classes: made marks for things that make them happy, completed mindful colouring, created artwork while discussing mental health, read linked stories and even did some physical activity too! In Reception class It was unanimous decision to dance to make them feel happy!

One of our parents held a cake sale, outside the school gates, raising money for Mind, one of the many invaluable mental health charities. This was a huge success, with lots of happy customers!





Antarctica Class (yr R)

As part of our science learning in our Understanding the World sessions, we have been exploring and investigating the inside of different fruits and vegetables. The children enjoyed scooping out the inside of the pumpkins and discovering the seeds. We found seeds in different fruits and vegetables too and the discussed how new plants can grow from these. The children were very interested and curious to see that seeds are different shapes, colours and sizes.











Oceania Class (yr 1)

This week Year One have been busy finding out about fact families in maths as part of our learning about addition. There was a baddy with a funny moustache that set us some challenges to build, draw and make a fact family before writing some equations to go with them!



Africa Class (yr 2)

The class had an amazing day at Sandringham to support their learning about Kings and Queens. The children had a guided tour around the Sandringham house and gardens. They had a 'What's behind the door?' workshop where they created a 'lift the flap' royal home.









Europe Class (yr 3)

This term in Design & Technology we have been learning about structures and sculptures, this week we created our own with aluminium wires! We worked in pairs and teams to help each other out.



South America Class (yr 4)

In History this week, we looked at the defences the Romans made across Britain to protect their legionnaires. We looked at the structure of forts and what would be inside them. We then made a fort ourselves and pretended to be Roman Soldiers.

In DT, we have begun constructing our Roman catapults. We discussed how to be safe using equipment and the children have been measuring accurately before sawing.



Asia Class (yr 5)

In PE Yr 5 have been developing their understanding of tag-rugby. They worked on their decision makingskills by working in teams attacking and defending. They were also practising their tagging skills by trying to get past the defenders and score a try.









North America Class (yr 6)

The children had a great trip to Norwich Castle this week and Millie has written a piece all about their day: On Monday the 7th of October, Year 6 went on a trip to Norwich Castle to learn more interesting facts about Ancient Egypt. There were lots of artefacts (which were over 3000 years old) to study and we used magnifying glasses to examine them in detail even more. We learnt about the process of mummification which was very intriguing. Year 6 made jewellery with huge smiles, which showed how much we loved it. Many of the Students said their favourite part was the jewellery making because they got to make their own necklace. All of it was very fun and the staff were respectful, friendly and welcoming to everyone and they even gave us a free pass to come again!!

Last week

We have been talking lots about Autumn and Harvest again this week. We watched a video about farmers harvesting their crop. We enjoyed seeing the combine harvester and discussed the process of wheat becoming flour, which we use to make bread and cakes. In Maths, alongisde our continued focus on matching, we have explored number shapes. We noticed their shape and colour and counted the holes in numicon pieces I-5. We've been super creative this week with both our mark making and our painting / printing skills. The children were introduced to our RE learning based on Christianity through a story book. The children were explored the symbol of the cross and created their own using various resources. On Friday, the children were super excited to find a frog near the school pond!



This week

We have begun following the Talk 4 Writing approach with our focus book 'Rosie's Walk'. We've learnt lots of words from the story, made actions that link to the positional language in the text and we've been making marks for parts of the story too. We've been using our fine motor skills to practise our pinchy fingers for various tasks, inside and outside. We have been exploring different materials we might find in the classroom and in our outdoor areas, sorting them into groups and discussing what we already know.







Next week

We will continue to retell the story of 'Rosie's Walk', retelling the story using our story tray, actions and class story map. We will also be making marks on our own story maps. Our rhyme of the week will be: Five Fat Sausages. We will continue to look at sorting in Maths, with a focus on sorting objects – classroom resources and natural resources. We will also continue our RE learning based around Christians and churches and our materials Science learning too.


Learning links at home
