Oceania Class (yr 1)

In Science we have been learning about the animal group: birds. We know birds have wings, a beak, feathers, a tail and claws. We also found out they are warm-blooded, have a backbone, lay eggs and not all birds can fly. Bats are sneaky, we found out they are actually mammals even though they look a bit like birds!



This week the class had a special treat - they got to meet a number of animals as part of our science topic, 'Amazing Animals'! Ed brought a millipede, a corn snake, a giant snail, a bearded dragon and a tarantula -Mr Johnson was very excited (and scared) to hold the tarantula! Can you remember all their names?









South America Class (yr 4)

In Year 4, we had a visit for Ed and his Mini Monsters linking to our topic of the Rainforest and our Science unit of classification of animals. The children loved holding the animals and asking questions about the creatures. As you can see, one of our children loved the snake and wanted to take him home.

In Art this week, we printed our William Morris inspired lino cuttings. The children really enjoyed seeing their designs come to life after the learning journey we have been on this half term.













Safer Internet Day 2025

Tuesday IIth February 2025 was Safer Internet Day and the theme was 'Too good to be true? Protecting yourself and others from scams online'. Digital Leaders kicked off Safer Internet Day by introducing this year's theme during collective worship. They did an amazing job and we are incredibly proud of them! Class learning focused on the issue of scams online and for young people, how to protect themselves and others, as well as what support is available to them. Safer Internet Day gave us an additional opportunity to focus on the online safety and wellbeing of children and young people. We also held a parent/carer e-safety briefing to discuss how to protect the online safety of children. Thank you to those who took the time to attend. Nursery

This afternoon, as part of Safer Internet Day, we were introduced to keeping safe when using the internet. We talked about the devices we might see or have access to. We then listened to a story about two friends 'Mo' and 'Jaz' who love watching videos about penguins online. But suddenly, the video stops and it changes to a new video which is not about penguins, but it's about something that makes us feel a little bit scared - we talked about ghosts or tigers or wolves - but Mo and Jaz did the right thing by telling their grown-ups. Their grown-up was then able to put the penguin videos back on! We talked about what we learnt:



Reception

For internet safety day, we talked about what the internet is and what we can use it for. We talked about the importance of staying safe using the internet. We know that if something upsets us or doesn't seem right, we always tell an adult.







Year I

In Year I for Safer Internet day 2025, we became Safer Internet Superheroes as we learned about key rules which help us stay safe online!

Year 2

Africa Class discussed our theme 'too good to be true?' and reflected on how to spot online scams. We discussed many online scenarios and reminded ourselves to 'stop, close and tell'. We named our trusted adults and identified what information we can and cannot share online.

In Europe class, we joined a live lesson that taught us all about how to spot a scam online. We gained points throughout the lesson and became a super scam spotter by the end! We understood that scams can pop up while we play games as well as when watching videos. We now know what to look for!

Year 4

In Year 4, we took part in the live lesson on the BBC where we looked at the theme of this year more deeply 'of too good to me true.' We completed an online safety word search to understand key terminology of online safety as well as play on interland. This online game allowed the children to explore the language people may use in scams and how they can identify when things may be too good to be true.

Year 5

Year 5 took part in a police presentation on staying safe online before solving the mystery of the stolen password and putting their knowledge to the test by playing the online game 'Interland'.

<u>Year 6</u>

This year for safer internet day Year 6 attended a whole school assembly excellently hosted by the digital leaders. We then joined nearly 150 classes on a forum hosted by Norfolk Police. They gave great advice on how to stay safe online line and really gave us some things to consider. Following that we discussed what we had heard and shared advice for one another from our own experiences.







What is my child trying to tell me?




